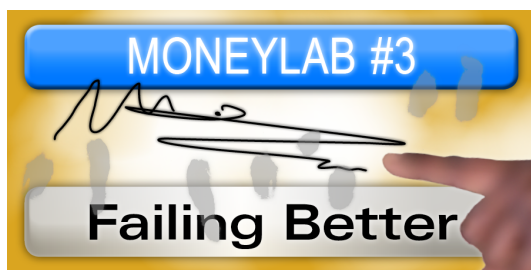

What can the WWW learn from the Wood Wide Web?

Some earn an upper middle class income by shouting “Totalitarianism!” and declaring things dead and lost to Silicon Valley. At the end of the day they get to go home to their cozy abode, kick off their shoes, to continue to lament over how it is all going to pot, over a glass of chilled Sancerre.

In the meantime, a group of botanists is revolutionizing the way we think about trees, intelligence and organized networks. A forest, it has become understood, is not just collection of individual trees. Beneath the soil of the forest researchers recently found a dazzlingly collaborative, future-bound, infrastructure that is called the Wood Wide Web. This Web is challenging us to rethink the metaphors and models we use to navigate and understand our organized networks.

An estimated 96% of all the internet content is hidden behind encrypted communication channels in the Deep Web. This evokes images of an underworld that cannot bear the light of day.

However this realm harbors important communication tools for human rights NGOs, political dissidents, activists, and every other user who wishes not to be tracked, stalked, and spied on. A place where anyone can remain anonymous.

Artists, designers, researchers and visionaries are challenged to create new images of the Deep Web.
